Taking Time

"And on the seventh day God finished the work that God had done, and God rested on the seventh day from all the work that God had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that God had done in creation." Genesis 2:2-3

Recently I have been thinking a lot about Sabbath. In recent months the subject kept coming up; as I prepped for teaching this fall, during some time away with friends, in conversation with my family, and even at the fall Pastor's retreat. In my experience when a topic keeps coming up it's usually the Holy Spirit trying to get my attention. As I was teaching a lesson on the Ten Commandments I heard myself say, "Following these commandments helps us to be righteous. To be righteous means to be in 'right relationship'. The commandments are all about relationships. So keeping the 3rd commandment, keeping the Sabbath helps us to be in right relationship with God and with each other." Sometimes the lessons I prepare are the lesson I need to remember. How then can keeping the 3rd Commandment help us to care for our relationships, both with God and one another.

God of the Sabbath

In September when we gathered with other pastors in Detroit Lakes our speaker, Rev. Kara Root, spoke about how God meets us in times of Sabbath. She reminded us of a story from the 16th chapter of Exodus. In the desert the Israelites cried out to Moses saying, "you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." In response God provides Manna every morning for God's people and quail every night. The people can only gather enough manna for the day ahead of them. Any extra that they gather will spoil. This is how they learn to trust God. Yet on the sixth day of the week they can gather enough for two days so that no one needs to gather food on the Sabbath.

I knew the story and I've told it many times. This time Rev. Kara Root said something I'd never thought of before. She acknowledged that this double gathering on the sixth day was so the people could rest. Then she said, "On the Sabbath God does not provide manna because even God rests on the Sabbath." I had always known that God rested after creation, but I had never considered that God continues to rest each week on the Sabbath. For forty years God feeds the people in this way and each week God's people AND God have Sabbath. This holy, set aside, day allows us to tend our relationship with God and God isn't too busy to meet us because God is at rest with us.

Sabbath as care for relationships

I often think about Sabbath as a time to rest, to recharge my batteries. Often it isn't until I'm taking some Sabbath time that I realize how much Sabbath is about tending relationships. When I take time away from daily duties I frequently discover that I've neglected my relationships with people. I haven't had time to return a phone call from family or friends. I haven't made time to check-in with someone I love who's struggling. I haven't snuggled on the couch enough reading with my 7-year-old. There are so many ways that time away allows for all of that.

This is the time of year when we gather with family and friends. Yet in the busyness of the holidays it can be hard to find time to tend relationships. There's so much to plan and prepare. There's so much to do that time with the people we've come to be with is in short supply. Instead that time with those we love can feel stressful, instead of helping us tend our relationships.

Maybe this year can be different! Maybe this year you can plan some time to rest together and tend the relationships that mean the most to you. While you're nurturing those relationships you are also invited to intentionally engage in the life giving relationship you have with God. Here, in the final weeks of the year, may you speak important words, may you hear important stories and may you strengthen your relationships in the midst of Sabbath.

Pastor Report:

- -Pastor Kristi began the meeting with a devotion.
- -Pastor Kristi reviewed the October 3rd meeting between 8 congregations and ideas on how to move forward. There will be a zoom gathering on October 26th to continue the discussion. Anyone is welcome to participate in that meeting. -reviewed the youth event on September 25th. 12 youth attended from English along with 3 from St. John's and 4 from Trinity.

- -Cleaning services: it was mentioned to have the youth take turns cleaning for a fee, if first volunteer isn't available, to raise money for their youth rally next year.

- -Snow removal: have a youth clean the sidewalks at the parsonage and church for an amount towards the rally.
- -painting needs to happen behind the boxes on the new LED lights on the outside of the fellowship hall.
